Risk Indicators

Corruption in public procurement occurs within an opportunity structure

Opportunities for corruption can emerge in all stages of the procurement process

Identifying corruption opportunities is key to estimating the overall risk of corruption at a procurement level




• Literature on corruption and procurement focuses on the risk indicators or red flags that point to corruption

Not all red flags or indicators are proof of corruption

• Red flags indicate a chance of corruption




Grouping of indicators









Pre-contracting Red Flags





Contracting process Red Flags

Invitation to tender

- Invitation to bid is advertised on a restricted basis
- Shortened time span for bidding process

Evaluation of bids

- Few offers received
- Strong similarities between bids
- Inaccurate assessment of bidders' qualification

Award

- Weighting factors altered during examination of offers
- Criteria used to select bidders altered
- Failure to verify certificates submitted



Post-award Red Flags

Contract management

- Substantial changes to allow more time and/or higher prices
- Product substitution or substandard work or service
- Non-sanctioning of economic operator

Order payment

- Lack of controls of works, services or supplies
- Unauthorized advance payments
- Approval of false or inexistent claims



Description and analysis of some indicators

Contracting authority has been convicted by final judgement, or has bad reputation

The use of accelerated procedure

High estimated value (contract of outstanding value)

Successful procedure without contracting

Contract can be renewed (several times, or for a long time)

Duration of evaluation (long)

What is a reference price?

- ✓ A sort of "fair" value in the context of public purchases
- ✓ An efficient price calculated through a survey



✓ Regulatory effect depends on sectors (ex. Health)

Why ANAC is responsible of this calculation?

Prevention of corruption in public administration and in public procurement



"ANAC [...] in order to promote the economic efficiency of public contracts and the transparency of purchasing conditions, [...] provides to prepare **reference prices** for goods and services [...] under the most efficient conditions, among those with the greatest impact in terms of cost to the public administration".


Reference price: on goods with a certain degree of homogeneity




> It is necessary to identify comparable goods/services

> The comparison of prices of completely different goods would lead to

completely misleading results





Reference Prices - Standardization



Standardization:

The process of "construction" of goods / services comparable to each other



Ex-ante Standardization → before data collection

Ex-post Standardization → after data collection


using regression based methods

In conclusion, reference prices:



- Can be considered a "smart" spending review tool
- Directly **reduce** the economic over-income (incentive for corruption)
- summarize a multitude of **information**, promoting transparency and accountability of public administration purchases
- Allow for the construction of overspending indicators, which, together with other indicators, are capable of signalling potential anomalies (especially in cases where <u>different indicators</u> converge in the same direction)
